TO THE 2023 NEWSTEAD LIVE MUSIC FESTIVAL



Is it real? Is this Newstead Live 2023? If you're reading this, Yes, we're back!!!

Like so many other festivals, we've been in a holding pattern for two years. In 2022, we almost landed, being forced to cancel 16 days out from the start. It was heartbreaking to get on the phone to all our treasured performers and give them the news.

But it came with a promise they would stay on the bill for 2023, hence the tag "Here is one we prepared earlier". Having said that, there was still a lot of work, but it is a labor gladly undertaken. So, here we are.

On the plus side, we couldn't book our Troubadour Foundation winners of 2020 for the cancelled festival because they were both interstate acts but now they will be here! Welcome back to We Mavericks and poet Kate Wilson. Both were festival debut acts in 2020 and captivated the audience. We look forward to having them back, so if you missed them first time around, make sure they are on your dance card this time.

A new addition to the festival this year will be the Festival Parade, featuring the Kyneton Street Band, Zamponistas (try keeping them out of a parade!) and a bunch of local kids showing off their crafty creations and adding their rhythm sticks to the parade music. Follow them from the primary school to the Festival Village in time for Sunday's Pool Party.

I don't have to tell you how good it will be to see some of our favourites back again - isn't that why you've come? Oh, and some new faces to look out for, of course. Will this year's Troubadour Foundation award come from the old or the new?

The Live'n'Local stage faced COVID challenges, and has been short-staffed, but it is back in the Festival Village, featuring the studio recording award donated by Sound Recordings of Campbells Creek.

The Live 'n' Local stage is usually managed by a team of school students but because of COVID, it was difficult to recruit new students. The original students, now at university, have managed it this year but we are looking for interested high school students to add to the team next year.

The Festival Village is where you will find food vans and market stalls, as well as the swimming pool, Lilliput and the free Live'n'Local stage.

THE FESTIVAL VILLAGE

Located in Panmure Street, near the pool and Lilliput.

Everyone is welcome in The Festival Village. This is where you will find the Live'n'Local outdoor stage, the swimming pool and Lilliput (the kindergarten). Here also are the food vans and a market stalls. Look out for Michael the Balloonologist before and after the Kids' Programs at Lilliput in the mornings. NOTE: This is an unticketed area. Yes, it's free!



VENUES

Troubadour Live Music Venue & Bar

Andrew Pattison's Troubadour was a much loved acoustic music venue in Melbourne in the late 70s and early 80s. In homage to him, the nature of The Troubadour as a music venue remains fundamentally unchanged. Food & alcohol are supplied by the Newstead Football Netball Club, including wine from Andrew's Burke & Wills label.

The Newstead Community Centre

Festival Reception is in the foyer. The main hall is one of the prime venues of the festival. The Community Centre Café operates in the old section, featuring Klua Sathorn Thai food, and a beer and wine bar run by Shedshaker. The hall and the café are both airconditioned.

Lilliput

This is the kindergarten. It features children's shows in the mornings, and is a popular spot for more intimate performances in the afternoons.

The Anglican Church

Located across the street from The Troubadour, immerse yourself in the delightful acoustic sound in this tiny country church.

The Enviroshop

This space is the refurbished workshop of an old service station. In keeping with its history, here you will find music workshops and perhaps themed events.

Shedshaker Stage & Bar

Shedshaker Brewery of Castlemaine bring their portable bar to Newstead Park, next to The Men's Shed. The Shedshaker stage will largely be a blackboard concert venue, but will feature some acts from the main line-up. This will be a session bar in the evening. Serving Shedshaker boutique beers. Wines include a selection from the Burke & Wills Winery. Bar open until 1am.

Live'n'Local Stage

An outdoor venue/stage which celebrates all types of music featuring local artists. The stage operates on Saturday and Sunday and is located in the Festival Village in Panmure Street. Musical styles may vary widely from that of the mainstream festival.

USEFUL INFO

SMALL IS BEAUTIFUL

Newstead Live takes place each year on the weekend before school goes back in January. It features The Troubadour live music venue, concerts, sessions, blackboard spots, workshops, Australia's original trad disco, and a pool party. There is good food, camping, spacious setting & no sound spill between venues. Adding to the intimate feel is The Festival Village, featuring the Live'n'Local outdoor stage, food vans and market stalls.

THE COMMUNITY CENTRE

Festival reception, merchandise sales, music venue and café. Reception hours: Friday 1pm - 9pm, Sat & Sun 9am-8pm, Mon 9am-1pm

NEWSTEAD RURAL TRANSACTION CENTRE (RTC)

Op Shop, tourist info, Internet access and Annual Secondhand Book Sale. Air-conditioned. Located near the Enviroshop so it's on the shuttle bus route. Open Sat & Sun 9am-4pm.

THE OVAL CAMPING

Located at the Recreation Reserve, where The Troubadour is based. There are basic facilities and no electricity. There are only a limited number of sites available. You must book and pay before the start of the festival. Cost is \$45 for a single site and \$70 for a double site for the weekend.

THE RACECOURSE RESERVE CAMPING

This is a little way out of town. There are shower and toilet facilities. There is no electricity. Cost is \$10 per night per couple, then \$5 for each additional adult. There is a shuttle bus that runs between the campground and the venues in the township. Pay on entry to the reserve. NOTE: YOU WILL NEED CASH FOR THIS!

FUEL

There is no fuel in Newstead. There is an electric vehicle charging station at The Enviroship. Petrol is available in Maldon and Castlemaine. Closest gas is Castlemaine.

ATM

There is no ATM in Newstead. ATMs are available in Maldon and Castlemaine. You may be able to get cash out at The Crown Hotel and the IGA, but bear in mind, they may not have large reserves of cash.

NO FIRES

Please don't light fires on the camping grounds or elsewhere, because (1) we are in a Fire Restriction period, (2) we would never be allowed to stage the festival again.



ACCESSIBILITY INFORMATION

The Newstead Community Centre, The Troubadour and Lilliput are accessible venues, including disabled toilets. Enviroshop is accessible. The Crown Hotel, the Country Store and the Bakery/ Supermarket all have portable ramps available. Dig Café has a ramp at the side entrance.

If you are confronted by a step at any venue, ask someone to track down the portable ramp.

NEWSTEAD & DISTRICT COMMUNITY BUS

This runs as a shuttle service between the Racecourse Reserve and festival venues. Cost is a gold coin donation per trip, or buy a weekend pass from Reception for \$5.

NO BYO IN THE VENUES

Please don't BYO drinks and food in to the festival venues. The Troubadour, Shedshaker Stage & Bar and The Community Centre have alcoholic and nonalcoholic drinks available, and there is plenty of food available in or near venues. The sale of these items is an important part of revenue for the suppliers, which include the Newstead Football Netball Club, The Men's Shed, and local businesses. Of course, you can BYO in the camping areas, but the township will be pleased if we attract a happy, peaceful and well-behaved crowd who don't walk the streets drinking and carousing! So do consider the local amenity, and the future of this event.

WATER

There are two water stations where you can refill your water bottles. One is outside the Community Centre and the other is at the entrance to The Troubadour.


